#### and the Chairman of the Board

Our clients get better. More than 24,000 people came to Pacific Clinics last year and they received mental and behavioral healthcare, as well as job training, housing, family counseling and so much more. While care continues for those who need it, many have successfully completed their treatment. This is our goal and we achieve it every day.

We are proud of the staff, donors and volunteers who make success possible.

With your help, Pacific Clinics made some important advances, including:

- The Tzu Chi Medical Foundation Mobile Vision Bus partnered with us to provided more than 300 clients with exams and glasses. We are currently working to expand services to other sites.
- Through our Head Start program, we piloted The Family and Caregiver Health Navigation Model, which enables families to get the physical and mental healthcare services they needed.
- We received a \$2.2 million award to expand Head Start/Early Head Start. This means more children in our community will be ready when they start kindergarten.
- We were chosen, along with four other agencies in California, to be part of a two-year collaborative that aims to test all clients suffering from mental illness for substance use disorders, since the two occur together frequently.

This past year has been full of internal changes at Pacific Clinics as we went through a reorganization and planned for a leadership transition.

James J. Balla, MBA, was named Chief Executive Officer. A new board selected Greg Bowman, former Superintendent of Burbank Unified School District, to serve as Board Chair. Together they will lead Pacific Clinics into the future.








#### YOUR COMPASSION WORKS WONDERS

# ■ Head Start/Early Head Start Makes Sure Children Start Kindergarten Ready to Learn.

#### Your Support Puts Kids on a Path to Success

The already very successful Head Start/Early Head Start program received two grants this year that will allow us to provide high-quality daycare and preschool for even more low-income families.

The Head Start/Early Head Start program supports the mental, social and emotional development of children from birth to five. In addition to education, it provides children and their families with health screenings, nutrition classes, mental health referrals and other social services.

Head Start/Early Head Start relies on community involvement. As part of its charter, programs welcome volunteers and in-kind donations.

We hear success stories every day. One father told us: "My youngest daughter started Early Head Start when she was just an infant. At the time, she was seeing three specialists for developmental delays... By the time she graduated into Head Start she was completely caught up and ready to meet her next educational challenges." The programs serve more than 450 low-income

preschoolers (ages three to five) and more than 300 infants and toddlers (birth to three).

Pacific Clinics has always been committed to early intervention. We got our start by offering children's counseling in 1926, and now more than 50 percent of those who come for services are children and young adults. We know from our experience that children who receive the treatment and guidance they need are less likely to need services as adults.

Head Start students are more likely to graduate high school, more likely to go to at least one year of college, less likely to be "idle" - meaning out of school and unemployed - and less likely to be in poor health, according to an American Economic Journal study.

At Pacific Clinics we believe investing in our children makes their future and our community's future brighter.

Janet came to Pacific Clinics after she had a severe emotional break, which resulted in her losing custody of her children. At first, she participated in group therapy and then began getting individual therapy. There were times when she felt alone and desperate, but her team at Pacific Clinics would not give up on her.

After several months, Janet was ready to look for housing and a job. Pacific Clinics staff referred her to a training program, where she became certified as a nursing assistant.

"I got the help I needed and I want to help others now," said Janet.

# Targeted Services Help Youth Transition to Successful Adulthood

#### Lorelle is a Role Model

Growing up in Los Angeles, Lorelle never felt like he had choices. "I lived with my mom, who was a single parent and grew up in a poor neighborhood," Lorelle said. "There was nothing I was interested in and so I was getting into trouble. I was involved with gangs, lost and wasn't going in the right direction."

He got into fights and was unmotivated. He was later diagnosed with Attention Deficit Disorder, Attention Hyperactive Disorder and suffered from depression, at times bordering on suicidal tendencies. The family moved to San Bernardino and basketball became Lorelle's main focus. He started doing well in school. Lorelle finished high school and headed to Pasadena City College.

Still, things weren't easy. There still was no money and after losing a job and apartment in the same month Lorelle found himself homeless. Lorelle found temporary housing through Pacific Clinics and other services through its Transitional Age Youth (TAY). Within two weeks he found a job and started to think about his future.

Lorelle believes his experiences can help others and wants to become a therapist, working with families in poverty and young men in gangs. He completed Pacific Clinics' Paraprofessional Mental Health Worker Training Course, a 10 week certificate program, which prepares graduates for entry level jobs in the mental health field.

"My future is something I look at with a smile now," said Lorelle.



## Making a Difference for Troubled Youth Your Support Helped Alicia Get Help at School

One of the wonderful programs you are supporting is Pacific Clinics' school therapy, based in schools throughout Southern California. Our therapists see troubled students, who may otherwise not get help.

Janelle Aguirre, a Pacific Clinics Marriage and Family Therapist, works in one of the high schools we serve. One day, a student, Alicia, was referred to her for missing school.

After a few sessions Janelle knew that Alicia was suffering from severe depression, coping with an alcoholic parent and mourning the death of a friend. She would need intensive therapy. But with Alicia not coming to school consistently, Janelle wasn't sure if therapy would be successful. She didn't know if Alicia would even show up.

It was slow at first, but Alicia started to build a relationship with her therapist. She would even come to appointments after she missed school that day. After eight months, Alicia began to thrive. She returned to school and began developing more friendships, socializing with others, and getting involved in activities. She was attending school every day and her grades soared. Emotionally she improved as well, communicating more to her family and eventually eliciting more support from them.

Thanks to your dedication, we are delighted to report that Alicia graduated from high school with good grades and is much more stable and confident.

### Headed for Jail at 16, Christian is Offered an Alternative

#### Now His Prospects for the Future Are Bright

Until last year, when a young teenager broke the law for the first time, they were assigned a probation officer and immediately booked into the criminal justice system. Now, there is another option that keeps young people out of prison - Pacific Clinics New Directions program.

This dynamic new pilot program is a collaboration between the Los Angeles County Probation Department and Pacific Clinics. It is the brainchild of former Los Angeles County Supervisor Gloria Molina who recognized that many young teens were incarcerated without anyone asking what might be the causing their behavior.

"The primary goal of New Directions is that a teen's first arrest is their last," said Program Director, Victoria White, MFT. The program's first client, Christian, was 16-years-old when he was referred to the program. "I got in trouble with the law at school. I ran with a bad crowd," Christian said.

When the school police caught Christian, he was offered two options. One would be to appear before a judge for sentencing, the second was to participate in New Directions for counseling and assistance with community resources.

The New Directions program also works with the family to foster understanding and create better means of communication. "I felt hopeless," said Christian's mother, Carmen. Christian and Carmen attended counseling together. "I learned so much about how to be a better parent and how best to support Christian. This program has helped bring our family together," she said.

# ■ Fred Finally has His Own Place — After 30 Years of Homelessness He Wouldn't Come to us for Services, so Martha Reached out to Him on the Streets

Martha Abea, a Mental Health Worker at Portals Wilshire Program, goes above and beyond when it comes to client care and advocacy. Martha sometimes comes to work at dawn to reach out to MacArthur Park inhabitants and the homeless under the freeway underpasses. It was during one of these outreach efforts that she met a homeless man named Fred. Initially he declined services, but after much diligence on Martha's part, he agreed to seek assistance.

When she learned that Fred had a lice and scabies infestation, it did not scare her away. In fact, she continued to advocate on his behalf to promote empowerment and help him seek treatment for the infestation.

Martha's persistence and dedication enabled Fred to finally move into his own apartment after 30 years of homelessness. We are so proud of Fred for this fantastic achievement and Martha for her selfless commitment to her clients. But mostly, we are thankful for our generous donors who make all of this possible.



Betty, fell and was taken to nursing facility. While she was there, it was discovered that she was a hoarder and was at risk of losing her house. Norma advocated for Betty, mediating between the staff at the skilled nursing facility, housing department, Adult Protective Services and the client's apartment complex manager. Despite the challenges, Norma ensured that everyone had a common goal: To help Betty.

Norma worked hard to gain Betty's trust to allow her to help her identify items in the home to discard. Norma gave Betty deadlines, which helped her take steps to save her house. When done, Norma gave the building management the green light to remove items from the apartment.

We are happy to share that Betty is now home, and is grateful that Norma cared enough to help her through her difficult time.


